Net Play Reminders (things to keep in mind as the play develops)

- Is the ball in the plane of the net? If so, it is fair game for both the setter and blocker.
- Is the setter a front-row or back row player? If the setter is in the back row, the height of the ball matters. If the ball is not completely above the height of the net, no issues. If the ball is completely above the height of the net, and the setter touches the ball first, causing the ball to contact a blocker's hands, the setter is guilty of a back-row attack (signal #7). If the blocker played the ball first (or it is simultaneous contact) and the setter is contacting the ball completely above the height of the net, it is an illegal block by the setter (signal #8).

Joust at the Net (things to keep in mind as the play develops)

- If after the simultaneous contact the ball land out of bounds, it is considered to have last been contacted by the player on the opposite side of the net from which the ball lands (9-4-6d)
- If the ball remains in play, the team receiving the ball is entitled to 3 more hits, and the player involved in the joust is allowed to make the first contact.
- If the ball rolls along the net and hits an antenna, it is considered a double fault (meaning both players are equally responsible) and the rally is replayed.

Points to Ponder

Situation: During team warm-ups, the officials notice a player on Team A is wearing plastic beads at the end of long braids. The braids are: (a) pulled back and secured in an elastic hair band; (b) free flowing, allowing the braids with beads to sway back and forth as the player moves. **Ruling:** (a) legal, (b) illegal. **Comment:** Hair control devices and other adornments in the hair that are securely fastened and do not present a risk of injury to the player, teammates or opponents are permitted. In (b) the long hair with beads swaying back and forth can present a risk. The official shall notify the coach of Team A and allow the player to make the equipment legal by securing the beads. (Casebook page 14 Situation 4.1.6 A)
